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Queen safety fears after slab falls from parliament [See correction]

Holyrood bosses were today urged to carry out urgent safety checks on the Scottish Parliament building before the Queen's visit in July.

The call came after a heavy granite slab from the wall of one of the parliament's towers came close to crashing down on top of the MSPs' restaurant.

Parliament officials said structural engineers believed there was a "low risk" of similar incidents, but they had not yet determined what had caused the 98lb panel, measuring 96cm by 43cm, to become detached.

The slab was taken down by abseilers on Monday afternoon, hours after the problem was spotted.

The incident is being compared to the embarrassing moment in 2006 when a beam in the parliament's debating chamber suddenly swung loose from its moorings.

That resulted in the chamber being put out of bounds for more than six months while the other beams were examined.

Independent Lothians MSP Margo MacDonald said: "I hope this panel's fall from grace doesn't imply an inspection of every single panel, but knowing the history of the building I wouldn't be a bit surprised.

"If that's the case, can a thorough inspection for safety be carried out before the Queen comes to open the fourth session of the parliament?"

The Queen will visit Edinburgh on July 1 and is currently on a historic visit to Ireland where she was today set to tour Dublin's Croke Park - the site of a British massacre of Irish civilians.

Parliament sources said they could not rule out the need for a full inspection of all the granite panels, understood to number more than 1000.

Architectural expert Peter Wilson, of Edinburgh's Napier University, said such an exercise would be "elaborate and time-consuming", probably involving specialist workmen abseiling down the walls, inserting camera probes behind the stone cladding.

"It's not easy to get at these things and it would cost a fair bit of money," he said, adding that wind could have been a contributing factor.

"It would be a cumulative thing over a period of time if there was wind pressure pulling the stone away from the fixing or the fixing out of the wall."

Mr Wilson said a blemish in the stone or poor workmanship could be to blame. He said: "With any kind of natural material you are always looking for a variation in the material itself to be the likely cause of a problem.

"At the time there was such a rush to get it finished, there might have been the odd fixing on the stonework that was not entirely precise."

A parliament spokeswoman said the panel was now with structural engineers for examination and they expected to know more later this week.

She said: "We are monitoring cladding panels, through daily visual checks, as a precaution. Our structural engineers confirmed today that there is a low risk of similar detachments."

In 2007, a large chunk of masonry fell at the front entrance of the Church of Scotland's General Assembly Hall, only hours before Prince Andrew, First Minister Alex Salmond and Lord Provost George Grubb passed underneath.
