#### **BBC News reporter:**

Now the football association chairman, Lord Triesman, has quit after a Sunday newspaper recorded him saying that rivals to England's 2018 World Cup bid were prepared to bribe officials at this year's tournament in South Africa. Just 48 hours ago, Lord Triesman led the group presenting England's bid to FIFA in Zurich. The new sports minister says the revelations are a PR disaster. David Bond reports.

#### BBC News reporter David Bond:

Just two days ago, England's World Cup bid looked to be going so smoothly. Full of confidence, FA and 2018 bid Chairman, Lord David Triesman, led the presentation at FIFA House in Zurich.

**BBC News reporter David Bond:** 

Today, he has been forced to resign from both positions. His resignation came after a Sunday newspaper reported details of a private conversation with a former civil service colleague. Lord Triesman was secretly recorded claiming that the Spanish and Russian FAs were colluding to bribe referees and influence the outcome of the 2018 vote.

#### Triesman Tape:

My assumption is that the Latin Americans, although they've not said so, will vote for Spain and if Spain drop out, because Spain are looking for help from the Russians to help bribe the referees in the World Cup, their votes may then switch to Russia.

#### BBC News reporter David Bond:

In a statement tonight, Lord Triesman said, 'Entrapment, especially by a friend, is an unpleasant experience both for my family and me ...but it leaves me with no alternative but to resign.'

#### Fran Unsworth:

To the case of the Sarah Ferguson tapes and the Lord Triesman tapes, you would apply the public interest argument. 'Is it in the public interest that we should know that actually Sarah Ferguson had had this meeting in a hotel when it appeared that she was taking money in order to introduce a member of the royal family to businesspeople?' And I think that the judgement we would make would be that, yes it would be in the public interest that people should know that that was happening. So on that basis we would be prepared to show that footage. And I think the same would apply with Lord Triesman which was that he was making a serious allegations about other countries and their football authorities so there's the central allegation which needs testing. There was also his own position with the FA at the time and later in the day he was forced to resign over it, so in order to tell that story we do need to actually show something of the original material that led to that. So under those circumstances I would argue there was a public interest argument in showing somebody else's secret recording.

#### BBC News reporter Jo Coburn:

Caught on camera. Secret filming on the House of Commons terrace recorded senior Tory Alan Duncan complaining in strong language that MPs are treated badly and the job they do now is too regimented.

#### Alan Duncan:

Basically, it's been nationalised. We have to live on rations, and they are treated like shit.

#### **BBC News reporter Jo Coburn:**

For many people, an MP's salary of 64 thousand pounds a year plus allowances may not seem such small beer, but Alan Duncan said the recent expenses scandal would put off anyone outside politics entering parliament.

#### Alan Duncan:

No one who has done anything in the outside world, or is capable of doing such a thing, will ever come into this place ever again, the way we are going.

#### **BBC News reporter Jo Coburn:**

The undercover filming was recorded and edited by a campaigner Alan Duncan had invited to the commons for a drink. The same campaigner who, just a few months ago, dug up the MP's lawn to plant flowers in the shape of a pound sign in protest at the gardening maintenance bills Mr. Duncan had claimed on expenses. He believes MPs should be more horiest.

#### Campaigner Heydon Prowse:

If MPs feel hard done by and feel that they, you know, deserve the expenses that, you know, and deserve these second incomes, and deserve these expenses, they should say it, as oppose to saying one thing in the press and one thing to each other.

**BBC News reporter Jo Coburn:** Today, Mr Duncan has apologised unreservedly, saying, 'It is a huge honour to be an MP and my remarks, although meant in jest, were completely uncalled for.'

#### Fran Unsworth:

I think in the case of Alan Duncan, we would want to look at whether we were being entirely fair to him, if we were going to run this audio which had been collected by somebody who had been invited in by Alan Duncan. Alan Duncan didn't know he was being recorded, and it's something that we ourselves would not have done under such circumstances. But I think that what changed this story was Alan Duncan himself reacting to it and apologising for it. And under such circumstances, we would have wanted to run the apology. The

material was already in the public domain, it had been put there by others. So therefore, we couldn't really tell the story itself without using some of the original recording.

I think that what I would also say about the Alan Duncan case is that there really was a clear public interest argument for running the material, because here we have a politician and several politicians - it was illustrative of the way that many of them were behaving in public, which was extremely contrite about the whole expenses scandal, but in private they had a completely different view. And I think that did justify why this material needed to be got out. Gordon Brown meets Gillian Duffy

Dramatic developments on the election trail this morning. Gordon Brown has been caught on a microphone calling a voter who confronted him in Rochdale "a bigot". The unguarded remarks were made after a campaign stop in Rochdale, and afterwards, Mr Brown described the encounter as a disaster. There's been pressure on the Prime Minister in the past few days to get out and about on the campaign trail talking to real people. Well that seems to have backfired on him today. I'm joined here in Westminster today by our political correspondent, Laura Kuennsberg. First of all, how did this all come about.

#### **BBC News reporter Laura Kuennsberg:**

Well, Gordon Brown was following a deliberate strategy which the Labour Party had changed to in the last few days which was to see more of Gordon Brown out and about meeting ordinary voters. Not just in micromanaged, stage managed party events. So, today he was in Rochdale, a seat that Labour hopes to take from Liberal Democrats, and he got chatting to a woman, Gillian Duffy, a 66 year old widower. She started a conversation with him about all sorts of topics. She started talking about immigration from Eastern Europe, she talked about pensions and the national debt. Now, after the conversation which, from Gordon Brown's view point, had ended relatively amicably - she said she was still going to vote Labour - but just as he got into his car, when he was having a conversation with his aide, once they were leaving the event, he was caught making these remarks about what Mrs Duffy had said:

#### Gordon Brown:

Thanks very much.

#### That was a disaster.

Gordon Brown's aide: What did they say?

Gordon Brown: They should never have put me with that woman. Whose idea was that?

Gordon Brown's aide: I don't know. I didn't see.

Gordon Brown: [...] Sue's I think. It was ridiculous.

Gordon Brown's aide: ...I'm not sure they'll go with that one.

Gordon Brown: They will. They will go with that.

Gordon Brown's aide: What did she say?

Gordon Brown: Everything. She was just a sort of bigoted woman.

#### Fran Unsworth:

The recording of the Gordon Brown exchange with his aide in the car over Gillian Duffy was actually a pool recording by Sky News. It wasn't actually our recording at all, but because it was pool, we automatically have access to it under the terms of trade. This was already running on Sky News when we became aware of it and then we had the decision about whether to use it or not. And we had a discussion at quite a senior level as to whether we thought that it was in the public interest that we should put a recording of somebody who didn't know that he was being recorded into the public domain or not. Now, it wasn't secret recording in the sense that some secret recording takes place, because we had already agreed that he would wear the microphone. He had simply forgotten that it was on, so it becomes a public interest argument about, 'Well why should we, is it being unfair to him or not?' And I think that we took the view that we ought to show this material because of what it said about Gordon Brown's character and it was in the middle of the election campaign when his character is, of course, of interest to voters.

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
