Dear Rupert

I am writing about an important foreign policy issue - the Afghanistan campaign.

When I spoke to you some time ago, we were agreed on the importance of the war against the Taliban in Afghanistan and, just as we agreed on the importance of supporting our forces when they were in Iraq, we were at one over the imperative of supporting our military forces in Afghanistan.

I understood from that conversation that you agreed that The Sun would stop attacking our defence policy in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Yet, almost every day in recent weeks, The Sun has chosen to accuse me personally of letting the Armed Forces down.

The poils suggest that, even after the work we have done in tackling the Taliban in recent months, two thirds of the British people want our troops out of Afghanistan. While The Sun says it wishes to persuade people we need more troops in Afghanistan, all they have succeeded in doing is persuading people that our troops should leave Afghanistan.

Irrespective of such polls and the way The Sun behaves, I will stand firm for our policy against the Taliban. Indeed, even with an election imminent, I raised our number of troops in Afghanistan and I have done so even as the Netherlands, Canada and Japan prepare to leave and other countries decide not to respond with more. The year before I took over as PM we spent £750m pounds on our troops in Afghanistan. This year it will be £5,000m.

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But it is unfair, to say the least, to find the newspaper that says it supports the campaign in Afghanistan undermining public support by the way it behaves. If this kind of newspaper editorialising continues (and of course that is your right) the public will come to a settled view that they do not want their troops fighting at all.

My understanding is that we have been criticizing your Government for not keeping our boys sufficiently supplied with the best equipment—rightly or wrongly. We resolutely support the mission. It is just that our criticism has been on the mission's management.

There are other things that worry me about the allied position in Afghanistan and I attach a recent email received from a very good and reliable friend of mine in Kabul who moved from Australia back to Afghanistan to set up a commercial television station as soon as that city was freed.

I know the ultimate decisions on this will probably have to come from President Obama, but it would be awful if all our efforts come to nothing.

It was nice to hear from you above all the din of the election.

I am therefore sorry that The Sun has run such a politicised campaign which undermines the support we need for the war. Despite that, I will keep doing what is right.
