Finding support for bereaved children and young people

Where can I find bereavement support for my children?

- Our <u>directory</u> has details of local 'open access' services for bereaved children, young people and those caring for them. These work with bereaved children and young people whatever the cause of death, and you can refer your family to them directly.
- Your local branch of Cruse Bereavement Care may have a children's worker. Services are free to bereaved people. The charity provides support and offers information, advice, education and training services. 0844 477 9400 <u>http://www.cruse.org.uk/</u>
- Winston's Wish, the childhood bereavement charity runs a national helpline offering support, information and guidance to all those caring for a child or young person who has been bereaved. 08452 03 04 05.
- Your GP or school may be able to help you find a counselling or support facility for your children.
- If the bereavement was through cancer or other life limiting illness, you may be able to access bereavement support through your local hospice or palliative care team. How can I find work with bereaved children?

Our on-line directory is regularly updated with services for bereaved children, young people and those caring for them. Contact the services within your area and enquire whether they have any volunteering opportunities that you can become involved in.

Where can I aet training on supporting bereaved children?

- On the Childhood Bereavement Network, we list subscribers' training, conferences, seminars and workshops.
- Most local services provide specific training for their volunteers.
- National charities including Winston's Wish, the Child Bereavement Charity and Cruse Bereavement Care provide training.
- St Christopher's Hospice and Help the Hospices are working in partnership to deliver the UK's first stand-alone university-validated programmes in Childhood Bereavement. The Diploma/Certificate is part-time over one academic year and is taught over two weekend sessions at St Christopher's Hospice and six Fridays at Help the Hospices.

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 Your Local Education Authority may be able to offer training, and can be contacted through the Department for Children, Schools and Families <u>website</u>.

How do I set up a childhood bereavement service?

- We have published a series of <u>factsheets</u> for people wanting to set up a new childhood bereavement service. These cover planning your service, identifying needs and mapping services, raising funds, and ways of working with children and families.

- Please be aware of the ethical issues involved in interviewing bereaved families. We are aware of
 cases where bereaved families have received much unwelcome press attention, and also of cases
 where families have agreed to be interviewed but have been let down at short notice. Please ensure
 you treat families with sensitivity and respect, and that you follow the Press Code at all times.
- Your <u>local childhood bereavement service</u> may be able to link you to a bereaved family who would be willing to be interviewed.
