Press Complaints Commission thanks Baroness Buscombe for her major contribution

We are grateful that she will stay on as Chairman in the interim, as the PCC not only continues to serve the public in handling complaints, but begins the process of formulating improvements to the system of press regulation. Peta has made a major contribution to the PCC, and her work has led to many improvements over the last couple of years. She leaves the Commission structurally stronger than when she came in, and in a better position to continue its evolution.

We thank her for all that she has achieved thus far as our Chairman, and wish her all the very best for her future once she has handed over to her successor."

2. The Press Complaints Commission is an independently-run body which enforces the terms of the Editors' Code of Practice. It has a Board of 17 members -10 members of the public (including the Chairman) and seven editors.

The post will be openly advertised and take place in line with the public appointments procedure, including independent assessment of the process and consultation with the Commission. The PressBoF Board comprises senior newspaper and magazine industry executives. It will be responding separately to Baroness Buscombe's statement.
